The formatting is also good, with the exception of the Bibliography section: this should use a hanging indent. The topic of the thesis is interesting and informative. My only real criticism is that, as is often the case at this level, there is no clear research question; the thesis is "about" something but does not make arguments for or against any proposition.</p>

<p>1. Could you please summarize, in one or two sentences, the main argument that you are making in the thesis? What evidence confirms or disconfirms the position you are taking?</p> <p>2. On page 12, there is the following sentence: "Mathematics was fundamental in the South, where young women would keep records on the plantation." Since the thesis is concerned with the late 19th century in the US, what was the connection between the civil status of women at that time and the issue of slavery that led to the American Civil War (1861 – 1865)?</p>
